Students should not be making calls or texting during instructional time. We ask that parents reinforce responsible use at home and know that the only time 7-12s should be using and receiving texts/calls is at recess (10:15-10:30am) and lunch (12:15pm-1pm).



A recent study looking at young children found that absenteeism in kindergarten was associated with negative first grade outcomes such as greater absenteeism in subsequent years and lower achievement in reading, math, and general knowledge. Research shows that attendance is an important factor in student achievement. Monthly reports will be run at CBHEC/A and students who have missed 10% of school days and greater will be notified via email.



Arrive on time:

We have a number of high school students who consistently arrive after the 8:55am bell. These students are arriving to school via their own vehicle or they are travelling to school with a friend who has their own transportation. Late arrivals are disruptive to classes. Please speak to your child about this as if this would be a place of employment, this behavior would not be tolerated.

Early school cancellations

It is important that all students have an early dismissal plan in place. Please be sure you are signed up in "Stay Informed" (found on the SRCE website) so you will receive text messages if there is an early dismissal due to power outages, loss of water, power plant problems, wind, etc. Teachers in the early elementary classrooms try their very best to call all families so students do not arrive home to an empty house.

A Guide for Co-op Hosts

What is my role as the host/mentor?

- designate a staff member who will act as a mentor for the student
- provide a safe and inclusive work environment
- · assist the student in setting goals and developing a learning plan
- engage the student with meaningful progressive tasks that allow them to explore a career and further develop skills for success
- provide time for consultation with the student's co-op teacher to provide feedback including a mid-term and final assessment

What can students do?

Co-op students are learners and will not have the same level of experience and expertise as employees, however they are eager to be mentored and to learn more about the career and work environment.

Although students are prepared to do introductory level tasks, they will benefit from opportunities to engage in a variety of meaningful, hands-on work.

There will be many things students can observe, assist with, or do independently, depending on the nature of the placement. This is an important conversation to have with the co-op teacher and student.

How do I prepare the workplace for the student?

Prepare your employees for the student's arrival. Let them know what the student's role is and discuss opportunities to participate in the mentorship process. Consider a "go-to" person who likes to work with youth and can build a positive working relationship with the student. Share with mentors any relevant details from the students' paperwork completed during the pre-placement assessment meeting with the teacher.

Your student is about to come into a new environment. Be prepared to introduce the student to the staff and welcome them to your workplace.

What is appropriate supervision?

Appropriate supervision will depend on the nature of the work environment and should be discussed with the teacher and student before beginning the placement.

How do I evaluate the student?

The host/mentor evaluation contributes to the student's grade, although the final course grade is the co-op teacher's responsibility and is based on achievement of learning outcomes in the course. The evaluation focuses on employability skills and positive and constructive feedback, and should be discussed with the student and teacher. Ongoing feedback should be provided throughout the placement.

Foundational Ideas Of Restorative Practices

Foundational ideas of restorative practice include empowering others and using practices that provide high standards and high support.

Restorative practices have the following positive impacts:

- people of all ages are happier, more cooperative, engaged and productive, more likely to make positive changes when those in authority do things with them, rather than to or for them
- schools can adopt practices that provide both high standards and high support
- relationships change when we move away from blaming, stigmatizing, excusing or rescuing and use more positive language
- staff are empowered to respond effectively to classroom disruptions to end interpersonal conflict or minimize behavioural and relationship problems

Restorative Practices

Restorative practices are rooted in restorative justice. They emphasize repairing the harm done to people and relationships, rather than punishing people. By building more supportive learning environments and focusing on social-emotional learning, restorative practices can:

- reduce social barriers to learning
- engage more students
- create a context for understanding and valuing diversity
- nurture a sense of belonging
- promote positive mental health

Reminders

- ·Parents are reminded not to send birthday party invitations to their child(rens) classrooms as they will not be passed out in school.
- •Parents and visitors are more than welcome to visit the school. However, be sure that you only go as far as the office. For our students' security we ask that you don't go to coat racks, classrooms, the gym etc. during school hours. If you need to see your child administration will call your child to the office for you.
- ·We also ask that parents communicate in their child(rens) agendas if there are any after school arrangements, cafeteria instructions, and extracurricular activities that need to be noted. We have over three hundred students from pre-primary to grade 12 and it is not possible for our secretary to manage all these arrangements or changes in plans.
- ·Please ensure that you send your child to school with a water bottle. CBHECA does **not** provide cups and we no longer have the older style water fountains we have water fill stations.
- ·Students are not permitted into the school until 8:40am. Please do not drop your child(ren) earlier than 8:40am as there is no one available to supervise your child(ren) and the doors are locked.
- Parents of elementary students are encouraged to keep an extra set of clothes in their child(ren)s school bag in-case they get wet during the school day. This eliminates the need for phone calls home for dry clothes.

Student Pick-Up

When picking up your student(s) before the end of day due to illness, appointment, early dismissal or other reason, we are asking that you park your car in the parking lot or next to the curb by the flagpole and come to the door to collect your child(ren).

Reminder: Bus loop is closed to all vehicles during school hours (8:30-3pm) and parking in the bus loop after hours is not permitted – please use the parking lot when dropping off students or picking up students.

Please leave a message with your name, your child's name and reason for absence. If the school is not notified and we are unable to reach a parent/guardian the RCMP may be contacted to ensure the safety of the student.

ROOTS OF EMPATHY RESEARCH AND PROGRAM EFFECTIVENESS

Since 2000, the Roots of Empathy program has been evaluated in both comparative and randomized controlled studies designed to measure changes in the behaviour of participating students. Independent research has been conducted on three continents.

Key research findings show that Roots of Empathy children perceive a more positive classroom environment by the end of the program (e.g., increased sense of classroom belonging and peer acceptance). Roots of Empathy children also exhibit:

An increase in prosocial behaviour (e.g., sharing, helping and including)

A decrease in aggression—particularly significant given that children in the comparison classrooms show increases in aggression across the school year

An increase in social and emotional understanding

An increase in knowledge of parenting

An increase in cognitive and emotional empathy

Studies conducted by researchers at the University of British Columbia looked at specific types of aggression—proactive (bullying), physical, relational and reactive. All of these studies showed a significant decrease in bullying/aggression in the Roots of Empathy program groups.

An accelerated longitudinal study showed that the beneficial effects of the program were mostly maintained or continued to improve throughout the follow-up years (physical aggression decreased, indirect aggression decreased, and prosocial behaviours increased). It is worth noting that this study has been extended to include a long-term follow-up evaluation of the children and youth, who participated in the original evaluation. Health related behaviours and outcomes in the teenage years such as involvement with criminal justice system, age of first pregnancy and mental health outcomes are the variables of focus.
